



# Over to you... 2014

A survey about policing and crime  
for people in Derbyshire



Summary report and results:  
Community Safety Partnership areas





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## **Introduction**

Police and Crime Commissioners have a statutory duty to consult the public and ensure public opinion helps steer service reform.

The results of this survey help to give both the Commissioner and the Chief Constable a better understanding of the concerns of people within our communities and to ensure that we are listening and able to continue to deliver the best service we can.

Previously entitled 'Have your Say', the 2014 survey was renamed 'Over to You' and has aimed to increase both the number and the diversity of respondents.

Furthermore 2014 also saw the delivery of a more specific 'Youth Survey' which received nearly 4,000 responses, mainly from people under the age of 18 from representative groups spanning the entire county. This work helped form a stronger understanding about the concerns of a previously under-represented voice on matters of policing and crime. The results of the Youth Survey have been published separately from this report and can be found on the Commissioner's website.

The "Over To You" survey serves as a valuable health check on public confidence in policing and highlights local views on levels of safety, fear and perceptions of crime.

As with previous surveys, the data gathered will be relayed back to our communities and shared with local partners to help inform their own work.







## Conducting the survey

Between March and September 2014, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC) and the Constabulary ran a series of events covering each of the nine Local Authority areas in Derbyshire. Face to face interviews were the main source of responses; however, an online survey also helped us ensure that many more members of the community were able to participate.

As in previous years, the consultation programme was supported by a wide range of partners who helped to facilitate the various events. Assistance was provided by Police officers, Police and OPCC staff, members of partner organisations and volunteers.

Any specific concerns raised by respondents either at the events or online were passed on to the appropriate departments within the force for follow up. We found that people valued the opportunity to speak directly to local Officers in an informal setting, enabling them to receive advice, report local issues and get to know their local police teams..



2014 also saw an increase in the number of events that took place overall and included some more bespoke visits such as employers, schools, colleges and within the University. As a result there was a distinct increase in the number of younger people and working people completing the survey.

Furthermore in 2014 we also increased the number of visits to groups and events that specifically cater for some of the more vulnerable members of our community including, for example, those who are physically disabled, deaf or hard of hearing - to help ensure adequate representation from these communities in the overall survey.

## **Analysis and Commentary**

A total of 3,455 valid responses were received, of which 2,679 were through the completion of one to one questionnaires at the public events and 776 from the online survey via the Commissioner's website.

The profile of the 3,455 respondents is broadly representative of the population of Derbyshire with regard to gender, age, ethnicity and sexual orientation. However, to ensure that the results are proportional, answers have been weighted by gender, age group and home local authority in line with the Census 2011 profile of Derbyshire.

Please note that the results shown are based upon those who have expressed an opinion; therefore any "Don't knows", "Prefer not to say" and blank answers to questions have not been included, unless otherwise specified. All data input and analysis has been conducted within the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and Derbyshire Constabulary.

Almost a half of people surveyed were still unaware of the national non-emergency number '101'. More than one in ten people said they would use an emergency number to contact the police in a non-emergency situation, and one in twelve would use the NHS non-emergency number. Younger people and those from ethnic minority backgrounds tended to be less aware of 101.

Around two-fifths of people surveyed had had contact with the police in the past 12 months, with the predominant reason being to report information or because they had been a victim of crime.

Three-fifths of respondents agreed that the police and local council are dealing with the anti-social behaviour and crime issues that matter in their area, although there was a fairly wide variance across the sections, particularly in D Division.

More than half of people surveyed thought that the level of crime/ASB in their area had stayed the same, and a further third thought that it had increased or decreased a little. Recorded Crime in Derbyshire has remained fairly stable over the past couple of years, with a small increase of 2.4% (1,239 crimes) in 2013/14 and the current year 2014/15 likely to show a small decrease of around 1.4% (730 crimes).



The top five priorities chosen from the list were: Burglary (selected by 42.4% of respondents); Drug taking (41.1%); Drug dealing & supply (35.5%); Child abuse & child exploitation (31.8%) and Speeding (25.2%). These priorities expressed by the public are broadly similar across all areas and sections of the community (apart from under 25's – and the results from the Youth Survey [11-15 year olds]) and are also consistent with the priorities expressed in previous surveys conducted by the Commissioner and Derbyshire Constabulary.

More than a quarter of respondents said they knew the name of the Police & Crime Commissioner, an increase from the 2013 Have Your Say survey.

As above, the demographics questions show that the sample of people surveyed was broadly in line with the population of Derbyshire in terms of gender, age, ethnicity and sexual orientation; however, results have been weighted to match the Census 2011 profile of Derbyshire residents.

### Q4a. Reason for answer

Respondents could provide more than one reason. Percentages are the proportion of the total number of respondents who gave at least one reason for the level of crime/ASB decreasing, staying the same or increasing. The main reasons given for each category were:

#### **The level of crime/ASB has decreased because:**

- There aren't any problems in my area (8.7%)
- I think/know there is less crime (6.3%)
- There is a visible police presence/patrols (4.4%)
- I live in a quiet/nice area (3.9%)

#### **The level of crime/ASB has stayed the same because:**

- I think/know it hasn't changed (10.2%)

#### **The level of crime/ASB has increased because:**

- There is ASB in my area (8.6%)
- There are burglaries in my area (5.9%)
- There are not enough police in my area (4.4%)
- There is a drugs problem in my area (4.2%)
- I think/know there is more crime (3.7%)
