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Introduction

Police and Crime Commissioners have a statutory duty to consult with the public and ensure public opinion helps steer service reform.

The “Over to You” survey serves as a valuable health check on public confidence in policing and highlights local views on levels of safety, fear and perceptions of crime.

This year the questions were devised with a view to informing the public about a number of policing issues such as: how they can contact the Police; raising awareness about the current financial climate and how changing trends in crime impact on the way police resources need to be allocated to ensure the most serious risks and threats are addressed as a priority. The questionnaire also asked respondents how confident they were that they would receive a professional service from the police if they were to be a victim of crime.

The results of this survey help to give both the Commissioner and the Chief Constable a better understanding of the concerns of people within our communities and to ensure that we are listening and able to continue to deliver the best service we can.

As with previous surveys, the data gathered will be relayed back to our communities and shared with local partners to help inform their own work.

Conducting the survey

Between March and August 2015, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC) ran a series of events across the county in all of the Community Safety Partnership (local authority areas). The events were supported by staff from the OPCC, Safer Neighbourhood Team Police Officers, Police Staff members, members of partner organisations and volunteers.

Face to face consultation provides an invaluable opportunity for quality engagement and for the public to discuss issues of local concern with local Police Officers and the Commissioner. The survey was also available to complete online.

Any specific concerns raised by respondents either at the events or online were referred to the appropriate departments within the force for follow up.

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Analysis and Commentary

A total of 1,897 valid responses were received, from one to one questionnaires and via the OPCC website.

The profile of respondents is broadly representative of the population of Derbyshire with regard to gender, age, residential location, ethnicity, and sexual orientation. However, to ensure that the results are proportional, and that results can be directly compared to past or future survey results, answers have been weighted by gender, age group and home local authority in line with the Census 2011 profile of Derbyshire.

Surveys were completed by residents from across the whole of Derbyshire, with over 140 respondents from each of the nine local authority areas.

The majority of respondents (9 out of 10) said they were aware of and would use the phone (101) to contact the police in a non-emergency. Fewer people were aware of the other options for contacting Derbyshire Police: email (1 in 4 respondents); completing a form on the website (1 in 6 respondents) or requesting a call back (1 in 11 respondents)

Just over half (51.7%) of respondents thought that an emergency call should be answered in 10 seconds, and three-quarters (77.4%) in 15 seconds. Two thirds (66.3%) of respondents thought that a non-emergency call should be answered in 1 minute, and 7 out of 8 (88.0%) respondents in 2 minutes.

Over half (52.0%) of respondents knew the name of their MP, only 10.0% knew the name of one of their MEPs, and 31.3% knew the name of the Police & Crime Commissioner, which is a rise from last year's survey when 26.3% of respondents said they knew the Commissioner's name.

The majority of respondents (60.8%) incorrectly thought that setting the budget for the police part of the council tax is the responsibility of the council and only 31.2% correctly identified it as a responsibility of the Police & Crime Commissioner. Two thirds of respondents (64.9%) correctly identified setting speed restrictions and placing speed limit signs on local roads as the council's responsibility. Most respondents (74.6%) correctly identified setting the Police & Crime Plan for Derbyshire as the responsibility of the Police & Crime Commissioner. The majority of respondents (84.8%) correctly identified managing a murder investigation as the police's responsibility. Most respondents (70.3%) knew that dealing with complaints about excess noise is the responsibility of the council.



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The majority (88.8%) of respondents thought it likely that they would receive a professional service from the police, with two out of five (39.9%) being confident that they definitely would.

Responses were divided amongst the various options for how much the force may need to save, although most went towards the higher end, with 28.3% correctly identifying £26 million.

More than three out of five (61.4%) respondents thought that Safeguarding [e.g. child exploitation, protecting vulnerable people, domestic abuse] should be a priority for the police. The other two issues chosen by a large proportion of respondents were Crimes with a serious impact for the victim [e.g. sexual assault, violence] (41.8%) and Crimes with far reaching consequences [e.g. organised crime, terrorism] (38.2%). These priorities are not inconsistent with views expressed by members of the public in previous surveys conducted by the Commissioner and Derbyshire Constabulary.

The majority (89.3%) of respondents agreed that the Police should be protected from further cuts.

As above, the demographics questions show that the sample of people surveyed was broadly in line with the population of Derbyshire in terms of gender, age, ethnicity, sexual orientation and disability; however, results have been weighted to match the Census 2011 profile of Derbyshire residents.
