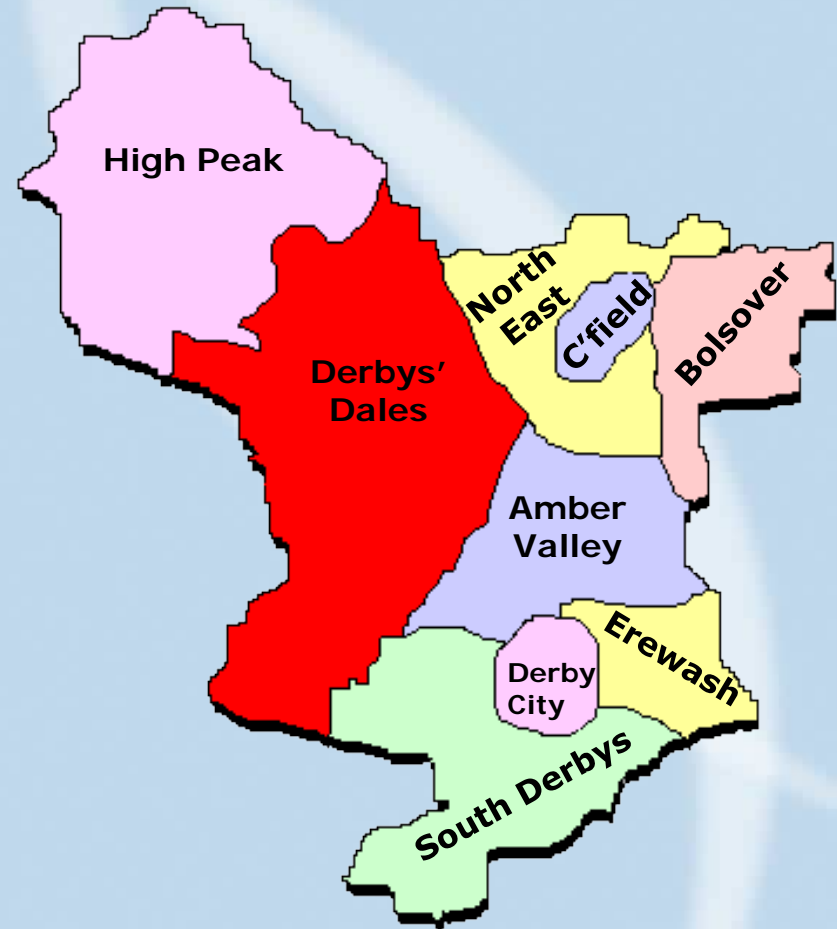

# Current Issues

## Derby City Centre

- Street drinking, psychoactive substances
- City Centre Summit. Large number of partners.
- Op Chesnee – targeted enforcement. Dispersal orders.
- Op Cassel – Mobile Police Station and dedicated resources within the City Centre to tackle this issue.
- PSPO being sought to further tackle the issue.

## Chesterfield Town Centre

- Rough sleepers, psychoactive substances, street drinking.
- Town Centre Summit held. Full partnership involvement.
- Op Barrichello
- PSPO at consultation stage.
- Enforcement but also treatment and support for individuals.

# Remedi/Derbyshire Victim Services - ASB

- Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) forms part of Derbyshire Victim Services
- Supporting victim's emotionally and practically following an offence
- Needs Assessment –What is happening and what is the impact?
- We work WITH people to identify needs and develop individual bespoke support plans
- Outcomes focused approach – how do you want to feel/be? What does this look like, i.e. what would 'safe' feel like? What strategies already exist/how develop new strategies?
- Support plans are reviewed jointly to show the progress made and to consider whether the strategies implemented are working/need adapting
- We utilise a bespoke evaluation process which assesses whether the needs identified were met/not met and to determine if the service has helped the victim to cope and recover

# Remedi/Derbyshire Victim Services - ASB

- From April 2017 to incorporate ASB non-crime, emotional and restorative support
- Provided briefings to all potential referees
- Utilising ECINS for recording

# Statistical Highlights

- April-August 2017 we received **168** referrals
- **44** from the police through 'opt in'
- **26** self referrals
- **98** through referring agencies
- High engagement rate
- An average of **85%** of service users engage with our service once referred
- Compared to **54%** which is next highest engagement rate for violence with injury



# Outcomes

- We have closed **56** cases over the **5** month period:
- **93%** of victims who completed our evaluation questionnaire said the support provided had helped them to cope and recover
- **98%** of victims who completed our evaluation questionnaire said they were satisfied with the support and service provided
- **100%** of victims who completed our evaluation questionnaire said they would recommend the service to others

# Risks and Threats: Anti-Social Behaviour

- **Use of ECINS**
- Feedback from referees is that they are not familiar with the system
- Most referring agencies will create profiles but then do not update
- Only one individual have said they are too busy to use ECINS
- Remedi will feedback regularly to the quarterly ASB forum where referring agencies attend
- Consistent message

# Risks and Threats: Anti-Social Behaviour

- **Some referring agencies are not acquiring consent or exploring the option of a restorative approach before sending through the referral:**
- We've been ensuring that a consistent message and being clear what referrals we can receive

# Current trends, risks and threats from substance misuse in Derbyshire

- On going and well publicised concerns regarding new psychoactive substances (NPS)
- 9.6% reduction in alcohol related crime  
*(12 months to June 17)*
  - 21.3% domestic related
  - 21% violent crime
  - 4.6% all calls for service
- New base line

# Local alcohol action area

- How can local authorities, the police and businesses:-
  - 1) ensure the safe movement of people in the night time economy (NTE)?
  - 2) work together to help prevent the sale of alcohol to drunks in both the off- and on- trade?
    - Drinkaware Crew
    - Intoxicated
- Cardiff Model

# Alcohol diversion scheme

- Since 2010 a 21% attendance rate
- Less relevant arrests have resulted in fewer invitations
- *‘Attendees knowledge of alcohol related matters is significantly improved and that they reduce the frequency and volume of their drinking after attending the course.’*

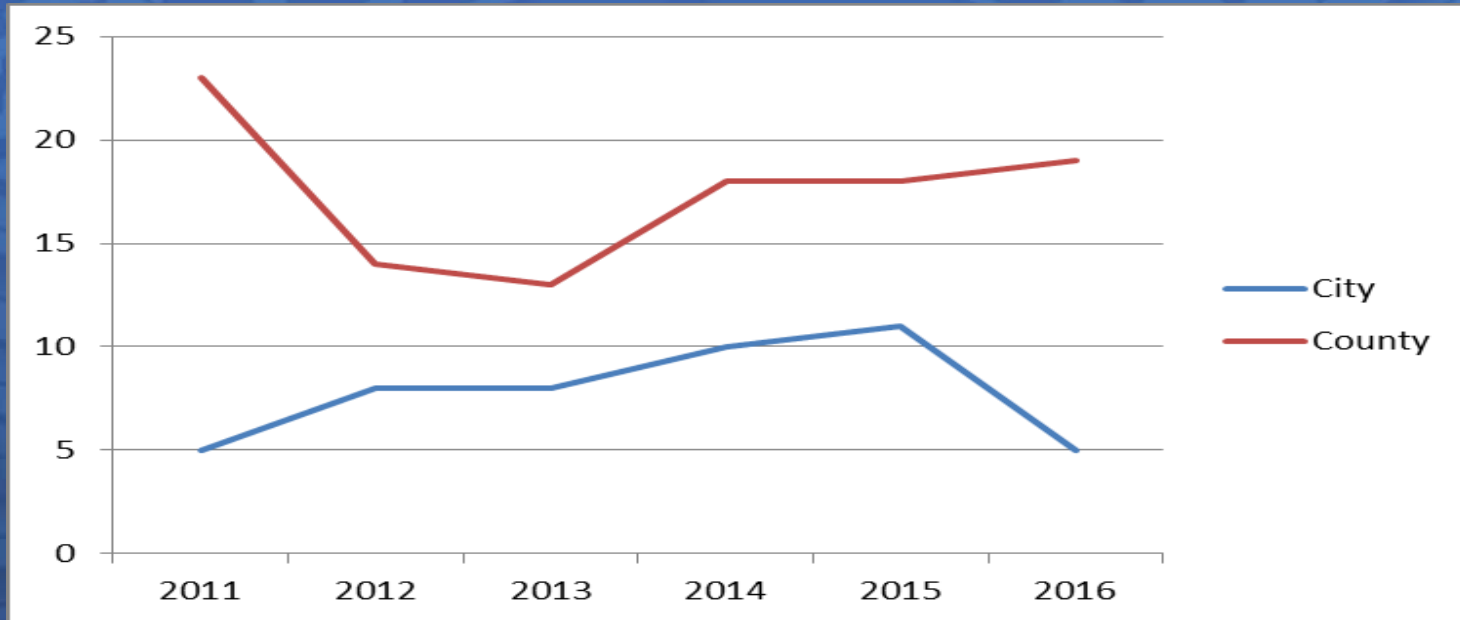

# Drug deaths & treatment



- 3181 persons in treatment in 2016/17, 17.7% of whom finished the 12 month programme
