


DELIVERING STRONG LOCAL POLICING

A message from Angelique Foster, your Police and Crime Commissioner

My focus is clear. I am working on behalf of residents to make sure our police force delivers the highest standard of policing and tackles the issues that matter to the public. I am determined that we see more police officers out arresting criminals and protecting the public.



My Police and Crime Plan has set out our key priorities for policing and driven an increased scrutiny of the force to make sure they deliver on them. We have seen significant progress in Derbyshire, including:

- 351 extra police officers
- 50% reduction in anti-social behaviour
- Home burglaries down by 31%
- 22% fewer fatal road collisions
- A larger Rural Crime Team
- Shorter 101 and 999 call waiting times

It is vital that we maintain this momentum. The budget for 2024/25 is designed predominantly to support ongoing investments in frontline policing. Over 77% of residents who responded to my recent policing budget survey supported an increase in local funding for Derbyshire Constabulary. I have therefore agreed to increase the part of your council tax that goes towards policing by £13 per year for a Band D property.

Every penny of our budget will be used to deliver on the public's priorities and increase visible policing to crack down on crime in Derbyshire.

This year's budget will support



- Additional police officers and PCSOs in our communities.
- **Extra police patrols** to drive down anti-social behaviour further.
- More burglaries investigated efficiently by investing into our new specialist Acquisitive Crime Teams.



- A further 100 officers trained in Pursuit Driving and additional ANPR capable vehicles to target more dangerous drivers and criminals on our roads.
- Increased police enforcement operations to reduce speeding and dangerous driving.
- Dedicated police support

for Community Speed Watch and Neighbourhood Watch.





- Further expansion of our Rural
 Crime Team to support rural
 residents and tackle organised gangs.
- £8 million for specialised victim support services such as stalking and domestic abuse;
 £500k in community-led safety initiatives.
- **100 more officers** taser trained.
- **Extra capacity** in new Missing Person and Child Online Exploitation Teams to protect more children and vulnerable people.



- **£1 million per year** investment to reduce 101 and 999 call waiting times further.
- Further **investment in our police stations** and bases to keep policing at the heart of our communities.
